The Labyrinth Movement Around the World

Welcome to the Winter Veriditas Newsletter under our new title! This volume focuses on the Labyrinth Movement around the world. As one of the early pioneers, I was simply one of many others engaged in the work, and now it is time for perspective. To introduce this issue, I will offer some connecting stories to what is now a worldwide movement. In Veriditas, we refer to these early times as the "seed planting" stage with the goal of "peppering the planet with labyrinths."

It was in 1994 that Barbara Hartford and I, through the help of Jean Bolen and the Tiger Trust, took the canvas labyrinth to Ireland. Our first night in Dublin, Barbara and I were amazed to find signs indicating a labyrinth somewhere in the city. With some effort in an unfamiliar place, we tracked the signs and found that they led to the Governor's Mansion, the exact site of our presentation scheduled for the next day! We roared with laughter!

Our second venue in Ireland was the International Transpersonal Association Conference in Kilarney, Ireland. This was the first introduction of the labyrinth to the Transpersonal Community. After the presentation, many people came up to ask how to create a labyrinth. We explained verbally, drew outlines on napkins and talked into the late of night. As a thank you, we donated a "Seed Kit"—an early form of teaching people how to create a labyrinth—to the Benedictine Monastery who gave their space for our canvas labyrinth. Such was one of the many beginning to draw worldwide attention to walking the labyrinth.

Soon after that, I traveled to Manus, Brazil, again with the ITA. This trip held many challenges since the presentation room was too small and somehow United Airlines lost one 'wing' of the canvas! Regardless, through the translated slide presentation, the idea jumped the cultural barriers.

My presentations and trainings started in Canada through the Heal-

ing Touch network by the late Janet Mentgen and Susan Major who enthusiastically set up workshops combining the labyrinth with this powerful energy based healing work. What started in Toronto soon went to Calgary, Edmonton and Vancouver and our trainings were enthusiastically received with record-breaking numbers in attendance. This work continues: Veriditas will be offering ongoing workshops there in 2009.

In the spring of 1997, I made my first trip to Australia where I received an invitation from The Reverend Andrew St. John of Melbourne who was a friend from my faculty days at General Theological Seminary. This trip laid the groundwork for my March, 2008 visit, sponsored in Melbourne through The Augustine Centre by Paul Saunders, at the Convent (a modern Presidio) by Ian McKendry and in Canberra by Alison Meretini at the Rachum Labyrinth Centre. I had the privilege of doing workshops and training 24 people in Melbourne, and I haven't even

The Many Labyrinths of Canada by Robin Bradley Hansel

The world's second-largest country is no stranger to the mystery of the labyrinth. This awareness is thanks to the efforts of a vast number of dedicated Canadian facilitators working throughout the provinces.

St. Paul's Anglican Church <http://www.stpaulslabyrinth.ca> is located in Vancouver, British Columbia in Western Canada. Reverend April Stanley led a group of 17 volunteers in the painting of the eleven-circuit permanent labyrinth on the hardwood floor of the church hall in 1997. Just three weeks later, she completed her training with Veriditas to become one of organization's first trained labyrinth facilitators.

Reverend Stanley has recently completed her thesis entitled "Creativity as a Spiritual Practice" for a Doctor of Ministry degree. She credits the St. Paul's labyrinth experience as opening the door for her to explore her own creativity and she continues to promote the labyrinth through her ministry as a tool of transformation.

Jo Anne Tharalson and the rest of the St. Paul Labyrinth Committee tend to think of their ongoing work in terms of "spiritual hospitality". Together, they actively share their dynamic mission statement with the Vancouver community at large.

"St. Paul's Anglican Church is committed to providing this spiritual resource, rooted in the Christian tradition, yet hospitable to all who seek a place of meditation and prayer. We offer to the community the sacred path of the Labyrinth for those who look for healing, renewal, transformation, refuge and peace," the Committee relays.

Volunteers are readily available for questions almost daily and three cornerstone events are held each year on Earth Day, All Souls Day and New Year's. On Earth Day, Jo Anne Tharalson describes that the Labyrinth Hall is decorated with plants, shells, lichen, pine cones and whatever else nature provides. The walkers move to the sound of birdsong instead of music. The All

Souls Day Walk provides walkers with a specific time and a sacred space in which to remember, mourn and celebrate those they have loved but see no longer. New Year's Eve walkers enjoy candlelight and a variety of musicians. They are invited to return New Year's Day morning to walk in silence for two hours, followed by two hours of music and then a community supper designed to invite neighbors to meet one another as together they welcome the year.

the City of Surrey is enjoying their first labyrinth in Fleetwood Park. It is a 42 foot classical seven-circuit pattern with gravel paths and granite borders. The labyrinth compliments the natural beauty of Fleetwood Gardens. Three rows of maple trees planted on three sides surround the structure inside the Bosque to provide a canopy of shade. Shrubs pruned into Celtic knots, a pergola and flower gardens complete the peaceful space.

Diana Ng of Minerva Innovations <http://www.minerva-innovations.ca/surrey-labyrinth-project> approached

the city back in 2006 about breaking ground for the public space. The manager of Fleetwood park was looking for something that would make the park unique and welcomed the idea of a labyrinth.

The non-denominational project is a community partnership between the City of Surrey's Parks and Recreation Department and the South Fraser Unitarian Congregation. The financial support of many small businesses in the city helped to make the project a reality in August 2008.

Eastern Canada has its own exciting share of labyrinths. The Toronto Public Labyrinth at Trinity Square Park in Ontario is a prime example. <http://www.labyrinthnetwork.ca/> Jo Ann Stevenson and Anne Tanner, both Veriditas Trained Facilitators along with many other important members of the Labyrinth Community Network (LCN) worked to bring this vision to

completion. The LCN is a group of volunteers who value the experience of walking or tracing a labyrinth. The Network collaborated with the City of Toronto and The Church of the Holy Trinity to open the labyrinth to the public in September 2005.

The Eleven-Circuit Medieval Labyrinth is conveniently located in the very heart of the city. It is wheelchair accessible and it offers a Braille sign at its entrance. Many annual events have been held including an Open Walk and Medieval Music to celebrate the solstices and equinox-

Labyrinths From a Mexican Perspective by Clarita Sierra

By going into a labyrinth, I am open to new “awakenings”: Moments of clarity in which new insights or understandings are gained. With this new awareness, the experience of life is seen differently and new possibilities are opened. Changes in patterns of thought, emotions, and behavior can occur. An awakening allows me the possibility of growth to new levels of psychological and spiritual maturity.

For example, 5 years ago I went to San Francisco, California, with my husband on a business trip. He had many things to do so I had a lot of time on my own. By this time, I was already working in Amatlán with Dr. Ortiz. He told me that while I waited for my husband, I should visit Grace Cathedral and walk the labyrinth inside. He had never been there but he knew it was a copy of the labyrinth inside Chartres Cathedral in France.

I started walking from my Hotel all the way up to Nob Hill where the Cathedral is located. I went inside and it was such a peaceful experience. I took my shoes off and started my walk. When finished, I went out of the church feeling a sense of Gratitude, Love, and Honor because I had the privilege of living this beautiful experience. Immediately I called Dr. Ortiz in Mexico to tell him about my experience and to

thank him for sending me there. In the afternoon, I took my husband back to the Cathedral so he could

also feel this beautiful experience. When he came out, he also called Dr Ortiz to tell him all about it.

Later, back in Mexico, I heard that Luis was planning to do some expansions at the hotel. I asked him if he could build a labyrinth and he immediately showed me all the plans, which included a labyrinth!

One week before the public opening, I had my second experience inside the labyrinth in this sacred and beautiful place called Amatlan. A Mexican Shaman guided me

through the labyrinth. He told me I should enter barefoot and with my eyes closed. As I was walking, I felt

the pebbles on the floor that were guiding me in the right direction. Every time I felt lost, the road felt rough and my feet knew I had to turn to the correct path. It was as if my intuition and my third eye were guiding me. While I was walking, some people were drumming. All of a sudden, the drums went faster then slower with special rhythms.

Sometimes I felt scared as if I was going farther away, getting lost. But as I continued walking and started trusting myself, I felt closer to my center. When I finally got to the

center of the labyrinth I knew I had found my spiritual core. The same as with my spiritual journey, when I feel lost and distant when I am the closest to finding my true self and my true core.

Both labyrinth experiences were very special. They made me realize that one must trust each process that life offers us to let our deep wisdom guide us.

For a few years during Dr. Ortiz's Seminars, I had the privilege of guiding these walks, we made many different exercises inside the labyrinth and each time it was a completely new experience. Some people come with questions, others just to slow down and take time out from a busy life. Some come to find strength to take the next step. Many come during times of grief and loss. Others come to find miracles and healing in their lives. In Mexico, I observe only people who are on a spiritual journey, or people with such great faith that they are looking for a miracle, know and appreciate labyrinths. Most labyrinths here are located in holistic spas or at hotels.

es, an Earth Day walk, and Doors Open Toronto which attracted more than 1600 visitors with its focus on “Sacred Spaces, Sacred Circles”. Workshops at local Hospices, universities, and cancer support networks have also been held on an outreach basis by dedicated LCN volunteers.

The Toronto Public Labyrinth volunteers have responded to the call for input on The Labyrinth Society's upcoming DVD documen-

tary entitled “Creating the Path”. Additionally, a collection of stories from labyrinth walkers produced and published by Jo Ann Stevenson and Cathy Anderson known as Mystery Stories from the Labyrinth is in its second printing and continues to share its uplifting message of the labyrinth with others.

Located just one and a half hours from bustling Toronto, Five Oaks United Church and Retreat Centre <<http://www.fiveoaks.on.ca/>> can

be found situated on 116 acres of Carolinian forest in Paris, Ontario. Their beautiful eleven-circuit labyrinth is placed in the grass off the banks of where the Grand River and Whiteman's Creek meet. Reverend Robin Donald McGauley, Program Coordinator for Five Oaks shares, “We celebrate this land as sacred because the First Nations people here say that where two bodies of water meet, that place is sacred.”

Since its construction four years

ago, the labyrinth has been the site of numerous workshops and retreats including a recent June 2008 session with Dr. Lauren Artress on “Rediscovering the Divine From Within” in conjunction with Veriditas Facilitator Training and the Centre's annual Summer Solstice Walk. Next summer's Solstice celebration will include Sacred Circle Dance with Catherine Maine.

Our initial experience working with labyrinths here in Guadalajara has been very successful. Our project started with children, working on drawing a labyrinth while they were receiving the walking instructions so they could understand both how to reach and how to get out from the center. When the labyrinth was complete, we entered the labyrinth, being sure each child had time to walk. When everyone was finished, we shared our experiences, learning to use this tool as a way to be in our own center, focused and aware.

The Grand Bahama Labyrinth by Robin Bradley Hansel

When the passion of the labyrinth found Barbara Chester a little over a year and a half ago, she

could hardly have expected then that it would lead her from her Caribbean home on Grand Bahama Island all the way across the vast Atlantic ocean to Chartres Cathedral. It was in France that Barbara trained under Dr. Lauren Artress to become a Veriditas Facilitator. It was also there that Barbara told Lauren she would personally begin a community project to build a labyrinth. Her island was in need of healing and peace ever since the 2004 devastation of Hurricanes Frances and Jean.

Barbara immediately spearheaded the fund raising needed to initiate the project. Soon, because of her

numerous speaking engagements and through the use of radio and television she earned the loving title of "The Labyrinth Lady." Friends donated the perfectly dimensioned piece of ground for the labyrinth and its meditation garden near a little chapel in Garden of the Groves. The chapel is a replica of the first church on the Island and it is surrounded by indigenous plants, waterfalls and streams containing numerous fish and turtles. Barbara and her committee, along with the support of a local nursery, planted additional wild shrubs, trees and plants known for their healing properties and symbolic references. A lily pond for reflection and an arbor is also planned.

"We placed rosemary for remembrance along the winding path leading to the labyrinth," Barbara shared.

Supporters who gave of their time, talent, materials and funding will be listed as an "Illuminator" to the project. Their names will be carved into stone in a "Monument to Creation" and placed in the Labyrinth Garden of Healing and Peace for the Community. On-going fund raising is planned.

Robert Ferre of Labyrinth Enterprises was hired to carefully construct the design of the full-sized Chartres style labyrinth to adhere to

sacred geometry. His assistant, Judy Hopen, flew to the Island to draw the path and direct the work. The color the Island committee chose for the field of the labyrinth was specifically mixed by the company for the project. It is known as "Bahama Blue."

The construction was challenging due to high heat and humidity. Most of the work took place under a tent for shelter from the sun. Despite the conditions, Barbara shared how the natural residents of the community embraced the project almost as much as their human counterparts.

"Even before the base was cemented,

soon as the covering was removed," she stated.

The official opening for The Grand Bahama Labyrinth was October 1, 2008. It will remain open for use anytime during park hours. Contact grandbahamalabyrinth@gmail.com for additional information.

Labyrinths in Scotland by Robin Bradley Hansel

Reverend Di Williams, Chaplain for the University of Edinburgh, has been involved with labyrinths in Europe since 1993. However, her passion was particularly kindled after visiting Grace Cathedral while on holiday in 2001. Now an Advanced Facilitator with Veriditas and a 2008 Master Teacher Apprentice in Chartres, this Anglican Priest shares the story of Scotland's first permanent stone labyrinth.

Reverend Williams collaborated with another Veriditas trained facilitator, Fiona Fidgin, back in April 2002 to offer the first canvas labyrinth walk to the University community. The local press and the Higher Education Chaplaincy took interest in the special time set aside for quiet, peace and reflection leading up to exams. Di began her Veriditas training that summer and happily obtained the support necessary to cover the cost of purchasing the University's own 32 foot Chartres canvas labyrinth <<http://www.chaplaincy.ed.ac.uk>>.

On September 11, 2002, the two facilitators offered an evening vigil entitled "September 11th, One Year On...". They advertised the event across Edinburgh as an opportunity to walk with three specific intentions: to remember the victims in

America and Afghanistan, to hope that we might learn the cost of war, and to ask for the wisdom and guidance of world leaders. The canvas was full of students and members of the wider Edinburgh community representative of all world religions.

Throughout the next couple of years, the University of Edinburgh Labyrinth Project continued to attract attention with its regular walks. Committed to offering a sacred space both to students and to the local community, the project extended an invitation to "those of all faiths and none who value the stillness and focus of this ancient and beautiful path". Walks on Easter and during Fall Fresher's Week were offered as well as outreach walks to prison inmates and the Girl Guide movement.

Reverend Williams eventually obtained a significant grant from the University Development Trust and the groundbreaking began for Scotland's first permanent labyrinth. The 42 ft. Edinburgh Labyrinth was constructed out of granite sets and bonded stones in keeping with

the cobbled streets surrounding its peaceful setting in the 18th Century George Square Gardens in Edinburgh's Old Town. It was formerly opened on October 6, 2005 by the Chair of the Scottish Arts Council, Rt. Rev. Richard Holloway. <<http://www.labyrinth.ed.ac.uk>>.

Today, The Edinburgh Labyrinth remains a vital part of its community. Labyrinth workshops were conducted during the Edinburgh Festival of Spirituality and Peace. A walk was held on the anniversary of the dropping of the bomb on

Nagasaki. Another walk followed a public conversation on war and peace between notable religious area leaders.

Reverend Williams recently facilitated labyrinth workshops at the Global Higher Education Chaplains Conference in Finland. She is currently helping universities abroad to develop their own labyrinth projects. Recently awarded an MBE, Member of the Order of the British Empire, in the June 2008 Queen's Birthday Honors List for her "Services to Higher Education", she is as committed as ever to the Veriditas vision of sharing labyrinths with the world.

Little Miracles on the Path

I love the theme of this edition of our journal. Looking at labyrinths outside of US borders is an important perspective. Labyrinths have the potential to heal our world. This story was sent to me in 2005 by facilitator, Valerie Whitworth, from Northern Ireland, a country with a contentious past. I was so pleased when Valerie sent it to me. Peace Found

I hosted a walk as part of an International Conference, in Belfast Northern Ireland. The purpose of the conference was to look at Community arts and ways in which arts can be used to bring people together in areas of conflict, and in areas of peace and reconciliation. It was the first time that I had hosted such a big event. There was a lot of interest and 25 participants came

from all over. Labyrinths are a fairly 'new' event here, and I have to do a lot of education I think to build up awareness of their potential. and quite challenging. I thought she was fairly determined not to be open to the experience. I started to relax when I could see the labyrinth 'working' on people, as they began to 'dance' together on the path. We sat on the labyrinth afterwards sharing experiences.

I was amazed to hear, that this woman, (the challenging person) expressed her initial reluctance, and resistance, but whilst walking found herself taken over with emotion. She couldn't believe

it. When she got to the centre, she felt suddenly full of joy and much lighter. She said, she had travelled from Finland, to Belfast, and she would not have believed anyone, if they had told her that she would find peace in the middle of Belfast, but she had.

Wow.

The Sacred Thread by Jay Edge

I live in London, England and have been offering labyrinth based workshops and events for the last 4 years. In Spring 2006, I began working with a friend and fellow therapist and labyrinth facilitator, Elizabeth Clarke. Together we created an ongoing series of labyrinth days for women that weave together our daily journey through the seasons with the journey through the labyrinth. We called our workshops Sacred Thread.

Currently we offer four days each year, one each at the Solstice and Equinox points on the calendar. The Solstice and Equinox points are points of transition and change on the wheel of the year, threshold moments when the ongoing cycle turns from one season to another.

We begin each Sacred Thread day by creating a communal altar. This is an important and soulful part of our

together. Over the years we have created altars holding flowers and fruit, pictures of loved ones, symbols

piece of poetry written on summer retreat, candles from Chartres and Grace Cathedral, home grown flowers and freshly picked beans, and an MA thesis, the summation of years of creative and academic work.

Once our altar is built and our circle candles lit we begin to explore how the archetypal energy of the current season is expressing itself in our lives. Each day is a perfect opportunity to pause and reflect on how in tune, or out of tune, our inner world is with what's happening in the outer landscape.

In the Spring, we explore what seeds we would like to consciously support and nurture through the coming months. Our seeds might

A Labyrinth for Kent by Jan Sellers

This is the story of a whirlwind 18 months. It begins in south-east England, at the University of Kent in Canterbury, where I work as Creative Learning Fellow. In February 2007, I discovered an article about quiet time and space at university, highlighting Di Williams' work with labyrinths at the University of Edinburgh. This sparked connections: I had been awarded funding for a new project about creativity and reflection in learning. As I learnt more, visiting labyrinths and talking with Veriditas-trained facilitators in the UK, I came to understand that the labyrinth could be used to foster reflection and creativity in a secular context – and could therefore be an exciting way of supporting teaching and learning, working with groups and individuals. Its history, across faiths, countries and cultures, made it a resource of considerable interest to a contemporary, international university such as Kent (with students of 139 nationalities this year).

Back on campus, I set up a Labyrinth Group with enthusiastic colleagues, and purchased a glorious 36 ft. canvas labyrinth. With

help from facilitators Di Williams and Jay Edge, we launched a series of labyrinth events. Interest grew,

and four of us had the privilege of training with Lauren in Chartres in May. As new facilitators, we hope this strength of numbers will embed work with the labyrinth into the mainstream of university life.

The idea of a permanent labyrinth in the University grounds seemed a distant dream; but the idea kept cropping up. A new project at the

University, 'The Creative Campus', opened doors for us and to our delight, funding was agreed. There

was a tremendous sense of people saying 'Yes!' Huge efforts were made at all levels within the University to make the dream a reality. We commissioned Jeff Seward as designer, working alongside Andrew Wiggins (Haywood Landscapes Ltd.) for construction, to build a labyrinth open to the whole community as well as students and staff.

Our new labyrinth, completed in August 2008, is settled on the slopes overlooking the city and cathedral.

The path is of Yorkstone – like the ancient paving stones of Canterbury – pale gold and grey, glowing in sunlight. An additional path encircles the labyrinth, holding this beautiful space. Our journey is just beginning; I'd love to hear from others who are working with labyrinths in universities and colleges. Special thanks go to all who have advised, designed, built and helped to make this happen – and especially to Lauren, without whom this adventure would never have happened. Joy on your journeys – and come visit us!



Jan Sellers has worked in adult and university education and guidance for most of her life; she founded the University of Kent's Student Learning Advisory Service in 1993. Jan is a Quaker and a student of Chantraine Dance. The labyrinth draws it all together: teaching, learning, faith, and dancing spirit.

be a new job or a new relationship, beginning a new project or simply choosing to emerge from a long and quiet winter of retreat and replenishment. During the bright days around the summer solstice, we explore what buds or flowers in us are opening into the warmth and light

of summer. This year's autumn celebration will see us celebrating the harvest. We'll honour whatever crop we each are gathering in as summer ends. Winter will find us exploring the descent into the dark of Solstice, finding a pathway through the dark, and exploring how to hold an inner light, even in the dark times.

At each Sacred Thread day we weave the stories and myths of the season with guided reflection, simple creative work and the experience of walking the labyrinth. It has been a joy to offer these workshops and to help spread the “word” about the labyrinth, which is not nearly as well known in England as it is in North America.

The Labyrinth, a Continued Italian Legacy by Maia Scott

Ancient cobbles lead the way, winding inward full of stories, life, and spirit. This certainly describes many a labyrinth – and my journey through the amazing walled city of Lucca, located in Northern Italy. A pilgrimage drew me to visit Lucca to “walk” the old finger labyrinth carved into a pillar in front of the Duomo San Martino. Such a thrill it was to run my finger over the path as many have done before.

One can't walk through the streets of the multitude of little medieval towns without encountering the sacred. For, around the corner, tucked lovingly into a crevice in an unassuming wall, is a little shrine to Mary. Then, down the way, sunlight and music warms the spirit as a lone singer belts his passion for his loving God to an empty little church. And, up a one winding lane, I follow the Stations of the Cross to end at a hermitage built into the side of the mountain.

Labyrinths are not infrequent surprises either. Italy's rich history, as seen in its art and architecture, reveals a reoccurrence of this sacred symbol. These appear in castles, as remnants in museums, peeking from ruins, on podiums, amidst cathedrals, and even in an old tomb. Certainly, beautiful Italy is abundant with representation of pilgrimage and a deep set appreciation for the sacred. Yet, until recently, there was an absence of walkable labyrinths.

Entering onto the path; the first and only labyrinth facilitator in Italy is Lucia Giovannini. She trained in Chartres and had a vision to bring the wonders of the walkable

winding path home. “My intent is to make the labyrinth available in Italy and I am putting all my effort into introducing this practice.” Her efforts don't stop with leading walks.

Without a canvas labyrinth available, Lucia needed to come up with some ideas. “I wondered a lot on what to do, how to solve this riddle.” Her creative spirit was

people. Lucia created four classical labyrinths out of candles, not an easy feat. She has also created labyrinths from simple pieces of wood and other natural resources.

“The Italian people either never heard of labyrinths or they only know the ones in old churches and they never thought you could walk on them.” The Catholic Church is certainly prevalent with a sparse scattering of mosques, Buddhist temples and Geova Witness sites. As seen at the Cathedral in Chartres, the Church would rather not draw attention to the fact that some of their places of worship house labyrinths. Lucia says that the people who are actually open to labyrinths are mostly people with a more New Age mindset.

Will Italian tradition and culture weave its way into the new labyrinth culture forming today? “It's still early to tell.” Lucia says. A private garden with a labyrinth is already listed on the Labyrinth Locator. Who knows what else is out there unknown? Now, Lucia Giovannini's passion will continue to light the way, inviting those who walk the path before them to become a living link to Italy's magnificent past.

Creating Our Labyrinth in Homoródszentmárton by Crystal Lanier

In the summer of 2008, 26 Unitarian Universalists from San Jose, California made a pilgrimage to the ethnic Hungarian village of Homoródszentmárton, Romania. We were hosted by the congregation of the Homoródszentmárton Unitarian Church (est. 1613). Eager to meet our spiritual cousins we had little but a design for a labyrinth and an intent to forge bonds between our congregations.

In two and a half days, members of both communities labored in blistering heat with naught but one wheelbarrow, a few shovels and a couple of picks. Working together we cleared and leveled an 8 meter diameter area for the labyrinth situ-

This labyrinth's most unique feature is the kopjafa at its center. Carved by the village doctor it is adorned with designs taken from the richly symbolic traditional folk language. The designs symbolize a celebration of the joint efforts of both communities. The path around

ated just outside of the old fortress wall of the church. With neither a common culture nor language, we worked together to shape the labyrinth. Guided by village craftsmen we set stones from a nearby river in concrete to mark the traditional seven circuit path. The entrance and cardinal points of the compass were marked with stones hundreds of years old from the medieval church wall.

the obelisk-like monument allows walkers to contemplate their own connections with life in the Romanian countryside as they encircle the river-rock base. Together with the large stones pointing to the corners of the Earth, the kopjafa creates a sundial that marks the passage of time from sunup to sundown.

Our Romanian labyrinth was created to echo the design of the labyrinth that lies in the center of our

sanctuary at the First Unitarian Church in San Jose, California. Every time one of us walks a labyrinth on either side of the ocean, we are strengthening the bond between our congregations and communities. All who took part in its creation celebrated its birth at a candle light vigil. We began the project as strangers but ended it as one community walking the labyrinth together singing rounds of "Dona Nobis Pacem". When the Universe, the One God, the Divine, conspires to connect two peoples in separate lands, all who touch the conspiracy, all who are blessed to be tools of that connection, are lifted into another plane where all is possible. Building our labyrinth in Homoródszentmárton was one such experience.

Crystal Lanier is a high school science teacher who loves working with youth and young adults and facilitating the creation of concrete experiences that allow people to connect with each other and the divine in their lives. Each summer she joins a fabulous team of grounded adults to build connections with and among the high school youth from the First Unitarian Church of San Jose. She lives with her husband, Chris, and two sons, Mike and Brian - whose golden spirits inspire her daily.

Labyrinths Are Truly Global

Africa has a long tradition with the labyrinth; from the pharaohs in the North to the tribes in the South. African tribes have for centuries had a tradition of initiating their young men and women into adulthood and this was done through a labyrinthine dance form, for example the Venda's Domba Dance (Snake Dance). The Zulus also had a game where a labyrinthine form was drawn on the ground and the player had to find the centre, which was the king's kraal.

At the southern tip of the African Continent lies a beautiful country that has gone through some major changes in recent times. With the end of apartheid, South Africans had to look for new ways to unite all its people and the labyrinth has been one of the tools that has allowed us to forgive and reconcile.

South African labyrinths started gaining popularity in the late 1990's. Most of the early labyrinths built were the Classical seven-circuit design. Today labyrinths are found throughout the country in schools, hospitals, parks, churches, cathedrals, city pavements, private gardens, wine estates, nature reserves, health spas, retreat centres, training centres, and garden nurseries. With such a wide diversity of labyrinths,

both young and old are given the opportunity to experience the walk for themselves.

With a number of established labyrinths now scattered around the country, the word has spread quickly. Testimonials of the benefits and healing powers of walking the labyrinth were published in various articles in local newspapers, television and spiritual magazines. Although many people have helped in promoting the labyrinth in South Africa, two women, both Veriditas facilitators, must be mentioned for being the pioneers in the revival of the labyrinth in the country. They are Terry de Vries Nel and Clare Wilson.

I built my first Classical labyrinth using the seed pattern for the millennium new year. At midnight, as the 20th Century came to a close and as the dawn of the next century unfolded, we walked the path. In 2002 I built the Celtis Labyrinth, an 11 circuit labyrinth on our farm in Magaliesberg using local Magaliesberg rocks. The Magaliesberg Mountain, an ancient range, dates back 200 million years and forms part of the Cradle of Humankind, a World Heritage site. Celtis Lodge Country Retreat is a lodge that offers its guests a peaceful place to relax and unwind. (Please visit our

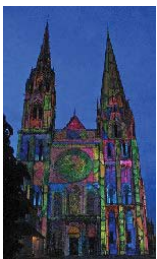
website www.celtislodge.co.za). The Celtis Labyrinth has drawn both local and overseas visitors to come and walk its path.

Various labyrinth workshops as well as Reiki attunements, drumming sessions and rituals have taken place. Also, my horses and I have for many years been doing labyrinth work with disabled children and AIDS orphans. It is truly amazing to see its healing power. No matter where we are in our journeys, we always receive more than what we are looking for. To me, the labyrinth offers a space, a quiet sacred space, to travel within. I have walked the path many times and have always been uplifted and motivated into living

happily in the now. But at times of sadness, loss or mourning, the labyrinth has, with respect, allowed me the time to grieve and to help bring closure to my pain.

Mike Burnett owns and runs Celtis Lodge Country Retreat on a farm in Magaliesburg and Etienne Diedericks works for Johannesburg Water, South Africa as a Biochemist.

Having built a powerful stone labyrinth with a centre obelisk in 2002 on Mike's lodge, both are involved in labyrinth building, walks and facilitation. Mike also works with horses and kids on horseback using a labyrinth designed for horses. The journey continues.

The Path Winds Full Circle Down Under by Maia Scott

It is amazing to imagine thirty years ago, Carol McDonough found herself in the Ely Cathedral captivated by a mysterious meandering path. Further pilgrimages landed her at yet more labyrinths, thus planted the seeds for a growth spurt of a sacred kind in her homeland of Australia. Carol yearned to bring this pilgrim's art home and, with the inspiration of Lauren Artress and help of a friend, she turned her deepest desire to reality.

Various sources agree that the labyrinth movement in Australia was pollinated by the appearance of Lauren Artress at a Jungian conference. For Carol, possibilities started to bloom from there. For one, during that same year, 1994, Carol McDonough's long awaited labyrinth was built. In her Earth and Spirituality blog, Carol describes its unique details, "Ours had overlaid on it the four elements – earth, yellow brick; air, white limestone; fire, red brick; water, volcanic rocks from the sea. There was equal space between them for plantings in each symbol colour: earth, gold/orange calendula and Californian poppies; air, lobelia blue; fire, Flanders red poppies; water, silver lambs ears." As Carol's initial labyrinth manifested, so did community interest. Thereafter, Carol McDonough blessed the earth with a continued sprinkling of her inspired paths.

In the early twenty-first century, maybe seven labyrinth enthusiasts shared their wisdom and stories. Then, one of these individuals, Lorraine Rhodda visited the States and networked with an eclectic international contingent of labyrinth gurus and enthusiasts and returned home with a mission to build a network of like-minded individuals in Australia. Now, as the Australian regional representative for both Veriditas and TLS, Lorraine Rhodda walks the path to success. "My role as Veriditas Rep in Australia is still at the stage of putting feelers out there for people to come together as

we evolve here." It is no easy feat to organize labyrinth facilitators across a huge distance to power forward as an organized unit. There is certainly an emergence of labyrinth work on a community grass roots level. A vision of a greater Australian "Path" of labyrinths has also been conceived to tie everything together.

As labyrinths and their interest take root closer and closer together, the synergy will foster an instinct to come together and Lorraine's open arms will reach the farthest corner of her motherland. To date, there are almost fifty labyrinths in Australia

“*Walking the Sacred Path: Rediscovering the Labyrinth as a Spiritual Practice*” was the first book written to offer the Medieval Eleven-Circuit Labyrinth as a spiritual practice. It is now in its second edition with a new preface and epilogue to capture all that has happened with the labyrinth since this book was first published in 1995. The book was instrumental in launching what the New York Times in May of 1998 named The Labyrinth Movement.

The second book, “*The Sacred Path Companion: A Guide to Walking the Labyrinth to Heal and Transform*” places all Lauren’s teachings since 1995 about the labyrinth in one place. In Four Guidelines to Gauge Your Spiritual Growth she outlines how we can measure our increasing spiritual maturity. In Lessons of the Labyrinth Lauren articulates what the practice of labyrinth walking can nurture within us. First time labyrinth walkers will find a useful introduction to the practice in The Art of Labyrinth Walking. Those knowledgeable about labyrinthwalking will be interested in the Applications and the many suggestions around forgiveness, grieving, engaging our shadow, and strengthening in Part 2: Specific Uses for Healing and Transformation.

The Companion Guide offers short journaling exercises in the chapter Start Where You Are for those who want to take stock of their lives. Others may want to dip into the sections on Healing, Shadow Work, Soul Assignment or Initiatory Rituals, depending upon what life’s challenges are for them at that time.



The *Sand Labyrinth* is both a meditation tool and a lovely accent to home or office. Keep it in plain view on your coffee table, desktop or nightstand. Use it frequently to calm yourself before a stressful meeting, to focus your thinking, to find solutions to problems, to open yourself to your own inner wisdom.
